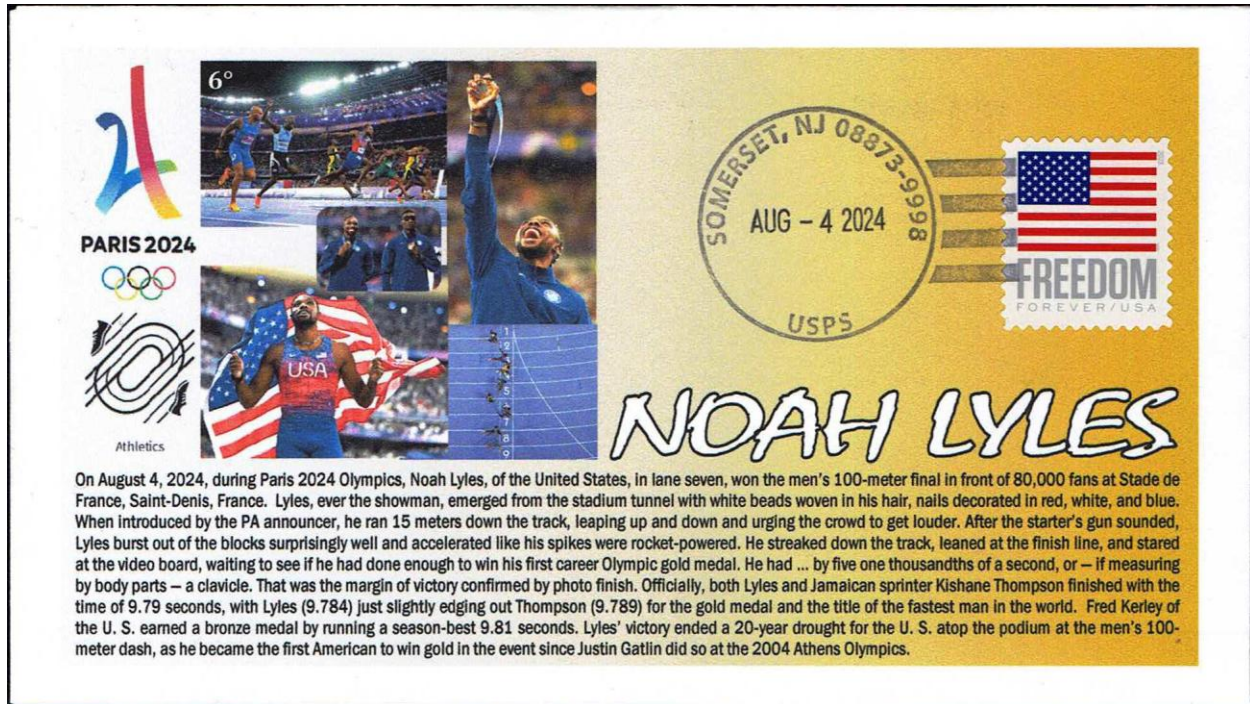

On August 4, 2024, during Paris 2024 Olympics, Noah Lyles, of the United States, in lane seven, won the men's 100-meter final in front of 80,000 fans at Stade de France, Saint-Denis, France. Lyles, ever the showman, emerged from the stadium tunnel with white beads woven in his hair, nails decorated in red, white, and blue. When introduced by the PA announcer, he ran 15 meters down the track, leaping up and down and urging the crowd to get louder. After the starter's gun sounded, Lyles burst out of the blocks surprisingly well and accelerated like his spikes were rocket-powered. He streaked down the track, leaned at the finish line, and stared at the video board, waiting to see if he had done enough to win his first career Olympic gold medal. He had ... by five one thousandths of a second, or — if measuring by body parts — a clavicle. That was the margin of victory confirmed by photo finish. Officially, both Lyles and Jamaican sprinter Kishane Thompson finished with the time of 9.79 seconds, with Lyles (9.784) just slightly edging out Thompson (9.789) for the gold medal and the title of the fastest man in the world. Fred Kerley of the U. S. earned a bronze medal by running a season-best 9.81 seconds. Lyles' victory ended a 20-year drought for the U. S. atop the podium at the men's 100-meter dash, as he became the first American to win gold in the event since Justin Gatlin did so at the 2004 Athens Olympics.

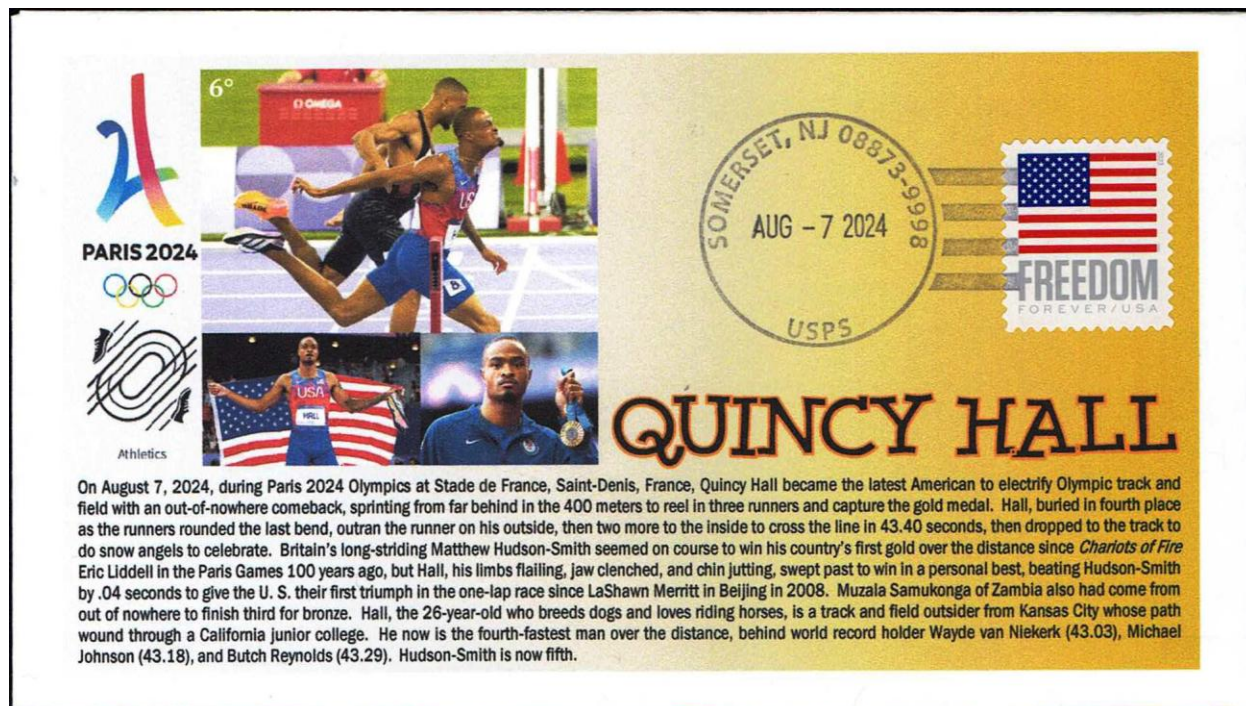

do snow angels to celebrate. Britain's long-striding Matthew Hudson-Smith seemed on course to win his country's first gold over the distance since *Chariots of Fire* Eric Liddell in the Paris Games 100 years ago, but Hall, his limbs flailing, jaw clenched, and chin jutting, swept past to win in a personal best, beating Hudson-Smith by .04 seconds to give the U. S. their first triumph in the one-lap race since LaShawn Merritt in Beijing in 2008. Muzala Samukonga of Zambia also had come from out of nowhere to finish third for bronze. Hall, the 26-year-old who breeds dogs and loves riding horses, is a track and field outsider from Kansas City whose path

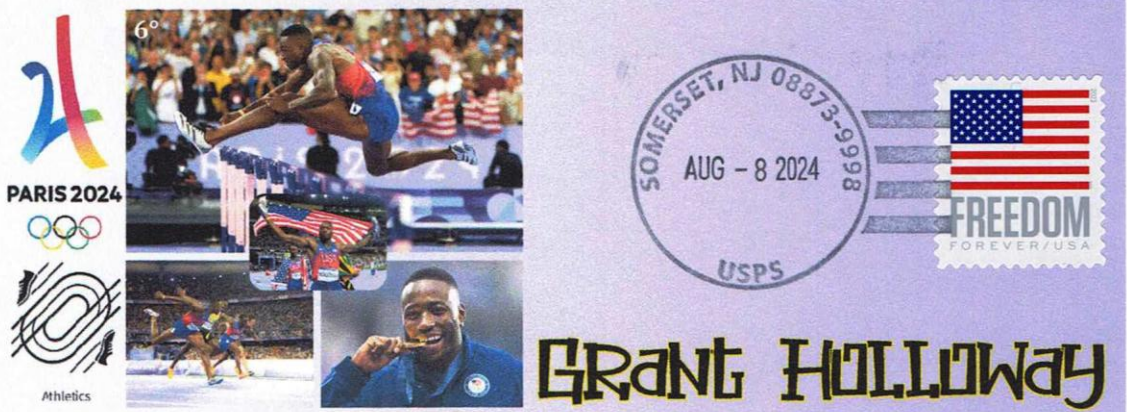

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GRANT HOLLOWAY

Grant Holloway has been one of the greatest hurdlers in the world for years, and long considered the best, but there was one glaring void on his résumé. Now, he can finally call himself an Olympic gold medalist. After blowing a lead and settling for silver in Tokyo three years ago when he fell .05 seconds short of Jamaica's Hansle Parchment, the 26-year-old American won the men's 110-meter hurdles with ease on August 8, 2024, at the Paris Games, finishing in 12.99 for a wire-to-wire victory at the Stade de France, Saint-Denis, France. His run gave the U. S. its third gold medal of the day, and teammate Daniel Roberts earned silver for his first Olympic medal on a photo finish. His 13.085 was three one-thousandths faster than Jamaica's bronze medalist Rasheed Broadbell. Holloway is just the second American man to win Olympic gold in the men's 110m hurdles since 1996. Aries Merritt's win at the 2012 London Games was the USA's first in the event since Allen Johnson in Atlanta. Holloway also became the eighth American to earn multiple Olympic medals in the event. The Chesapeake, Virginia, native and University of Florida alum is a three-time gold medalist at the World Championships, and in the 60 meters hurdles, Holloway is the world indoor record holder with a time of 7.27 seconds set at the 2024 USA Track & Field Indoor Championships. He had not lost an indoor sprint hurdles race since March 2014, when he was 16 years old.

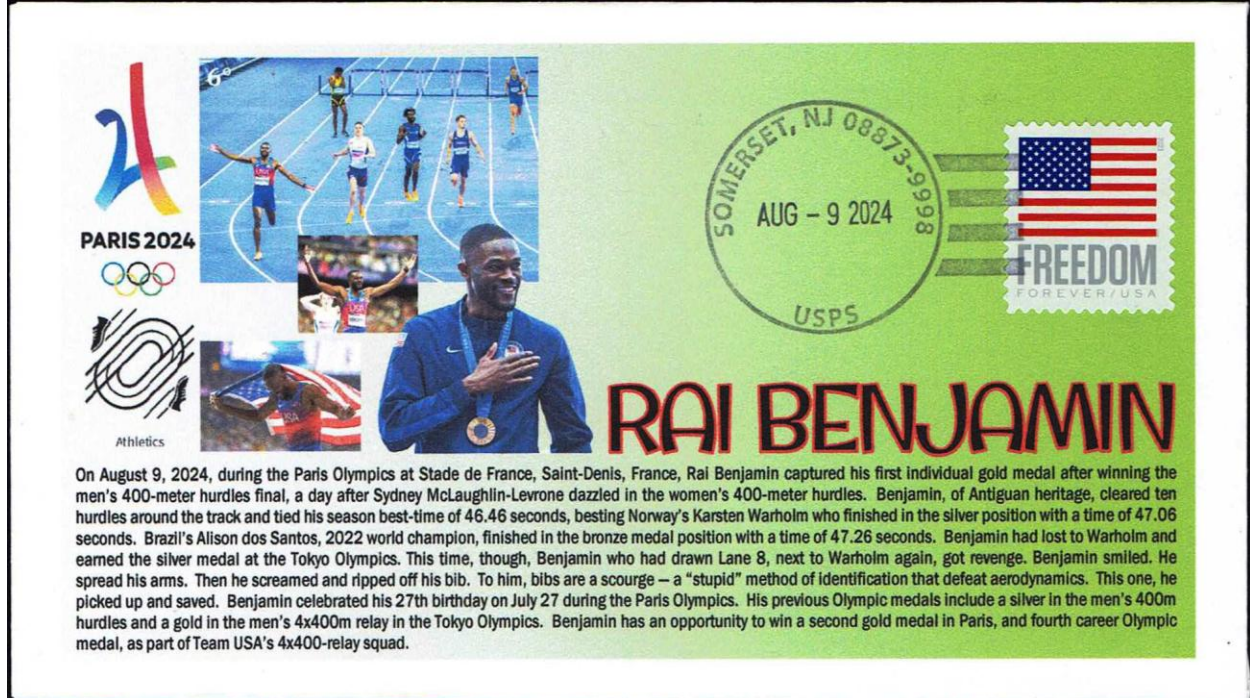

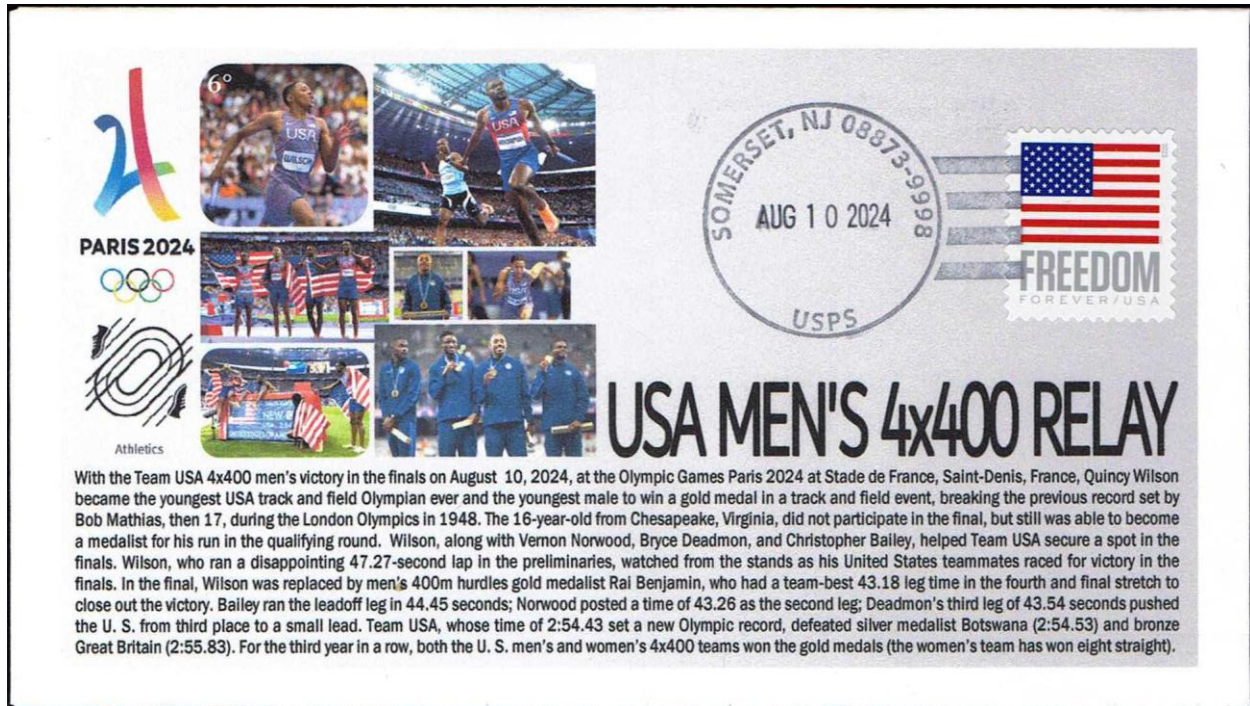


On August 9, 2024, during the Paris Olympics at Stade de France, Saint-Denis, France, Rai Benjamin captured his first individual gold medal after winning the men's 400-meter hurdles final, a day after Sydney McLaughlin-Levrone dazzled in the women's 400-meter hurdles. Benjamin, of Antiguan heritage, cleared ten hurdles around the track and tied his season best-time of 46.46 seconds, besting Norway's Karsten Warholm who finished in the silver position with a time of 47.06 seconds. Brazil's Alison dos Santos, 2022 world champion, finished in the bronze medal position with a time of 47.26 seconds. Benjamin had lost to Warholm and

With the Team USA 4x400 men's victory in the finals on August 10, 2024, at the Olympic Games Paris 2024 at Stade de France, Saint-Denis, France, Quincy Wilson became the youngest USA track and field Olympian ever and the youngest male to win a gold medal in a track and field event, breaking the previous record set by Bob Mathias, then 17, during the London Olympics in 1948. The 16-year-old from Chesapeake, Virginia, did not participate in the final, but still was able to become a medalist for his run in the qualifying round. Wilson, along with Vernon Norwood, Bryce Deadmon, and Christopher Bailey, helped Team USA secure a spot in the finals. Wilson, who ran a disappointing 47.27-second lap in the preliminaries, watched from the stands as his United States teammates raced for victory in the

finals. Wilson, who ran a disappointing 47.27-second lap in the preliminaries, watched from the stands as his United States teammates raced for victory in the finals. In the final, Wilson was replaced by men's 400m hurdles gold medalist Rai Benjamin, who had a team-best 43.18 leg time in the fourth and final stretch to close out the victory. Bailey ran the leadoff leg in 44.45 seconds; Norwood posted a time of 43.26 as the second leg; Deadmon's third leg of 43.54 seconds pushed the U. S. from third place to a small lead. Team USA, whose time of 2:54.43 set a new Olympic record, defeated silver medalist Botswana (2:54.53) and bronze Great Britain (2:55.83). For the third year in a row, both the U. S. men's and women's 4x400 teams won the gold medals (the women's team has won eight straight).

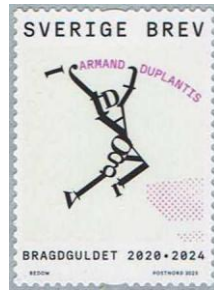

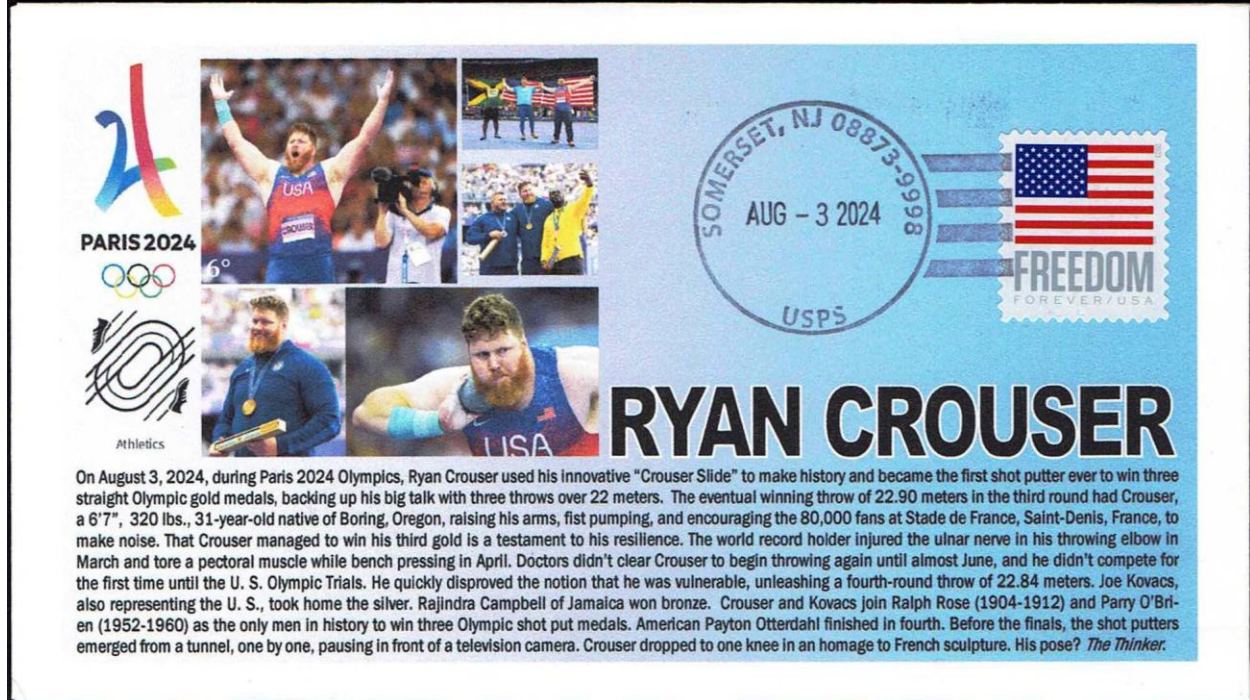

On August 3, 2024, during Paris 2024 Olympics, Ryan Crouser used his innovative "Crouser Slide" to make history and became the first shot putter ever to win three straight Olympic gold medals, backing up his big talk with three throws over 22 meters. The eventual winning throw of 22.90 meters in the third round had Crouser,

the first time until the U. S. Olympic Trials. He quickly disproved the notion that he was vulnerable, unleashing a fourth-round throw of 22.84 meters. Joe Kovacs, also representing the U. S., took home the silver. Rajindra Campbell of Jamaica won bronze. Crouser and Kovacs join Ralph Rose (1904-1912) and Parry O'Brien (1952-1960) as the only men in history to win three Olympic shot put medals. American Payton Otterdahl finished in fourth. Before the finals, the shot putters emerged from a tunnel, one by one, pausing in front of a television camera. Crouser dropped to one knee in an homage to French sculpture. His pose? *The Thinker*.

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USA WOMEN'S 4x100 RELAY

On August 9, 2024, at the Olympic Games Paris 2024 at Stade de France, Saint-Denis, France, the star-powered U. S. team of Melissa Jefferson, Twanisha Terry, Gabby Thomas, and Sha'Carri Richardson clocked an impressive 41.78 seconds to clutch the gold medal in the Olympic women's 4x100 meters relay in rainy conditions. It was Team USA's 12th title in the event, one more than the rest of the world combined. They defeated the British and the German teams, who clocked 41.85 for silver and 41.97 seconds for bronze respectively. The U. S. women finished second in the Tokyo Olympics behind a star-studded Jamaican squad, but Jamaica was without all of its stars, such as Shelly-Ann Fraser-Pryce, Shericka Jackson, and Elaine Thompson-Herah, due to various injuries. Paris was the very first Olympic appearance for Team USA's Terry, Richardson, and Jefferson, all of whom are training partners at their club in Clermont, Florida. Richardson took silver in the 100m earlier in the week, while Jefferson joined her on the podium with bronze. In this team effort, Jefferson clocked 11.46 seconds in the first leg of the final. Terry took off during the 4x100m final's second leg. Thomas ran a good third leg, and Richardson brought the victory home running the anchor leg. The gold was Thomas' second in Paris, having won the 200m on August 6. She's now a four-time Olympic medalist, with a bronze (200m) and a silver (4x100m relay) from Tokyo.

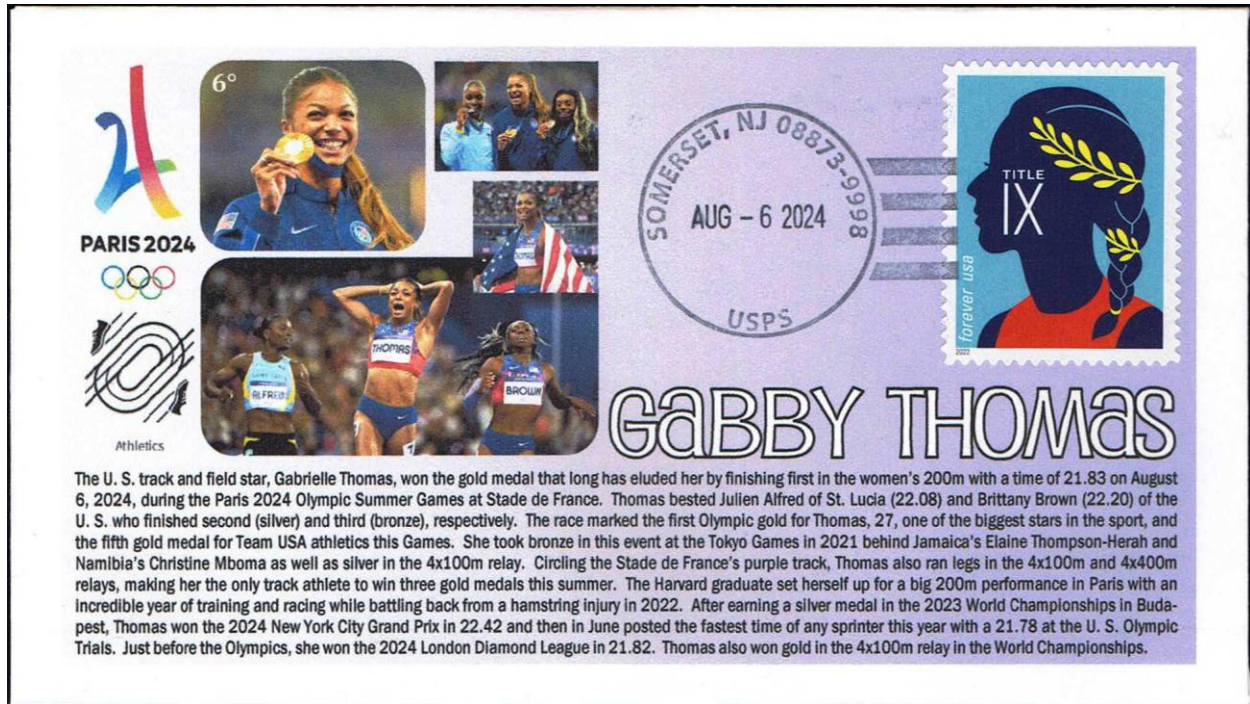

The U. S. track and field star, Gabrielle Thomas, won the gold medal that long has eluded her by finishing first in the women's 200m with a time of 21.83 on August 6, 2024, during the Paris 2024 Olympic Summer Games at Stade de France. Thomas bested Julien Alfred of St. Lucia (22.08) and Brittany Brown (22.20) of the U. S. who finished second (silver) and third (bronze), respectively. The race marked the first Olympic gold for Thomas, 27, one of the biggest stars in the sport, and

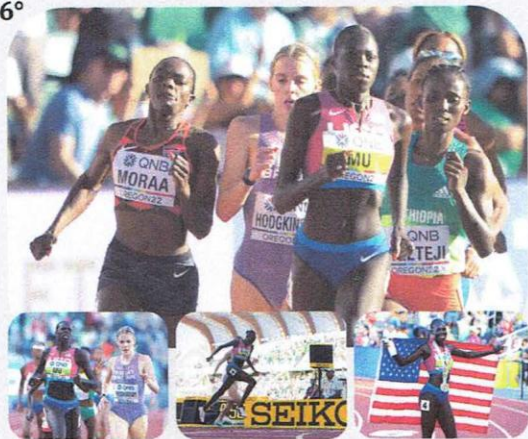

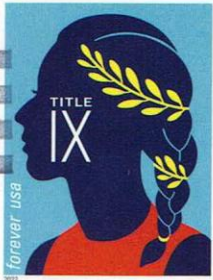

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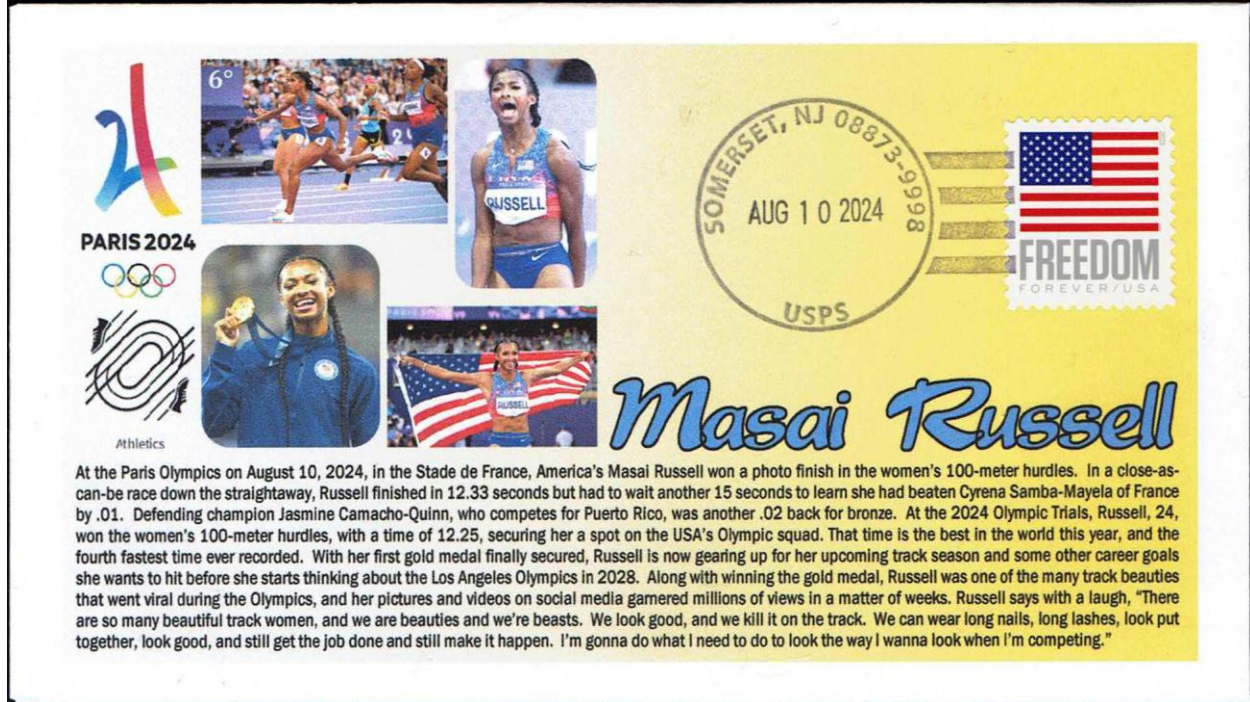

makes history in women's 800 meter final!

On July 24, 2022, at the World Athletics Championships at Hayward Field in Eugene, Oregon, Athing Mu became the first American woman to win Worlds gold in the 800 meters, out-kicking Great Britain's Keely Hodgkinson in a breathless neck-and-neck finish. Mu's time was 1:56.30 — the fastest time in the world this year — to 1:56.38 for Hodgkinson — also second behind her in the Tokyo Olympics. Kenya's Mary Moraa won the battle for bronze in a personal best of 1:56.71, edging Ethiopia's Diribe Welteji who also ran her best time of 1:57.02. Mu, at 20, became the youngest woman to own Olympic and World titles in an individual track and field event in history, a year after becoming the second American woman to win an Olympic 800m title (Mu was the gold medalist at last year's Summer Olympics in Tokyo), and she is undefeated in outdoor 800m races dating to 2019. About her latest win, Mu said, "It was a fast competition, and I love competing against other fast women." And! Athing's a "Jersey Girl!"

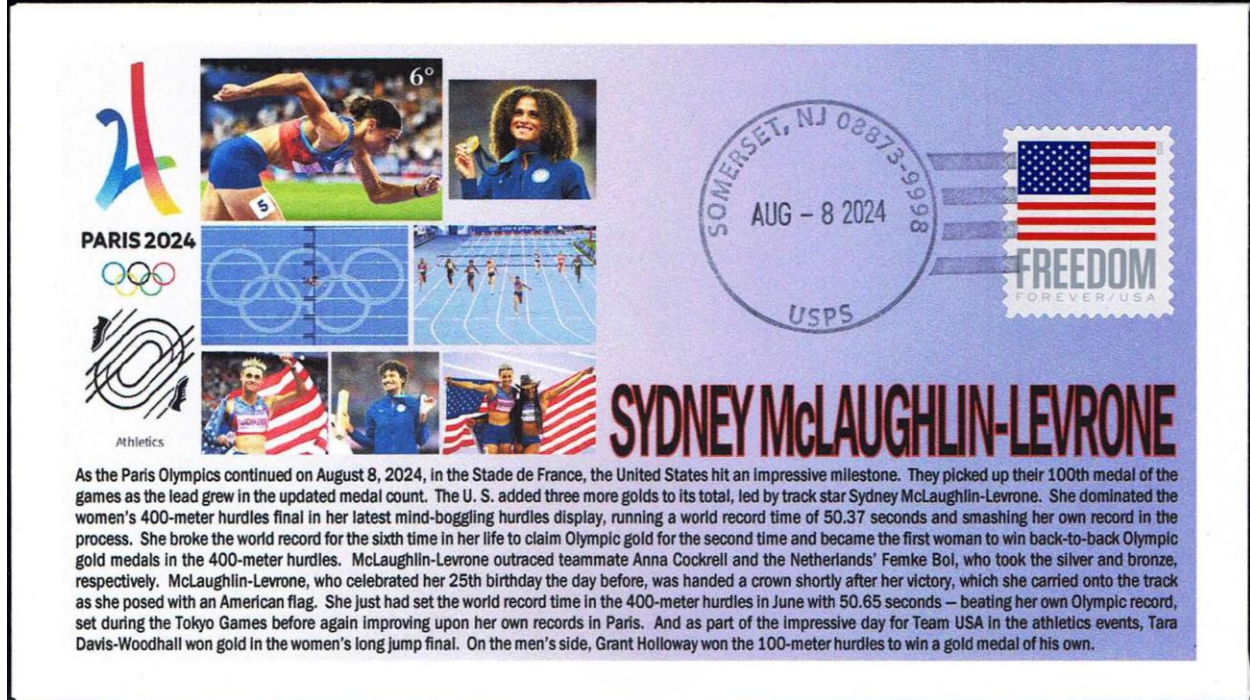
At the Paris Olympics on August 10, 2024, in the Stade de France, America's Masai Russell won a photo finish in the women's 100-meter hurdles. In a close-as-can-be race down the straightaway, Russell finished in 12.33 seconds but had to wait another 15 seconds to learn she had beaten Cyrena Samba-Mayela of France by .01. Defending champion Jasmine Camacho-Quinn, who competes for Puerto Rico, was another .02 back for bronze. At the 2024 Olympic Trials, Russell, 24,

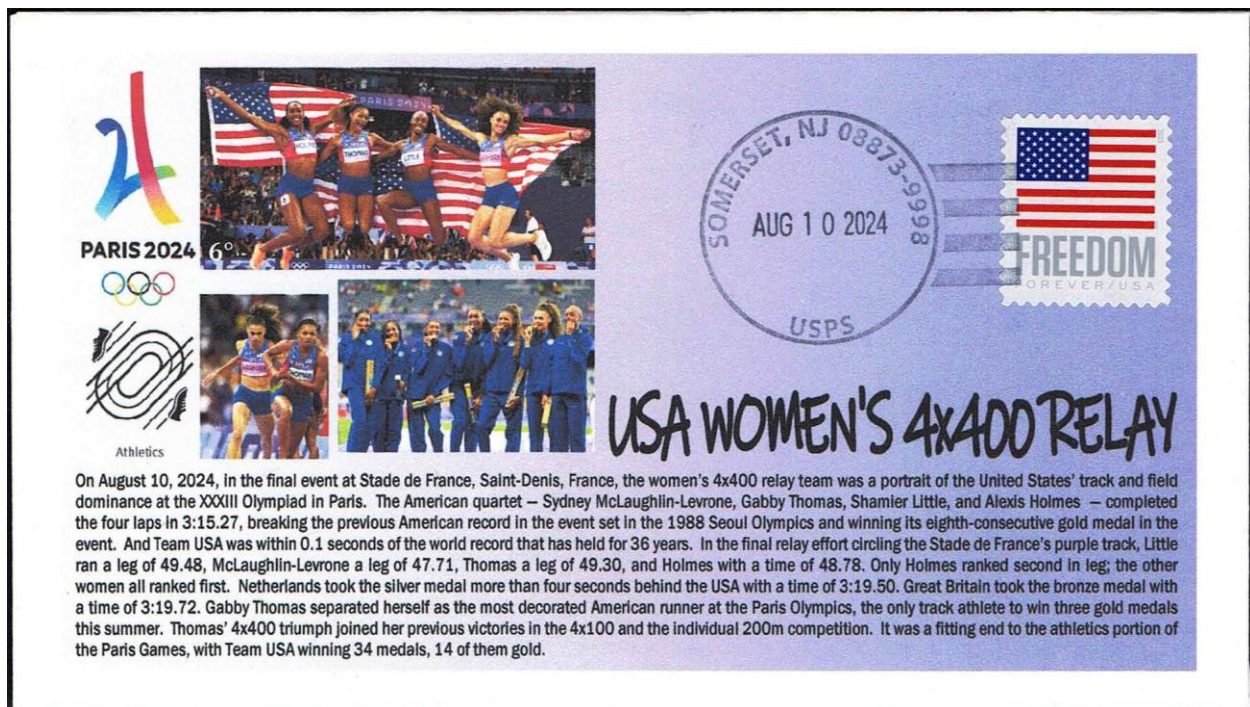

On August 10, 2024, in the final event at Stade de France, Saint-Denis, France, the women's 4x400 relay team was a portrait of the United States' track and field dominance at the XXXIII Olympiad in Paris. The American quartet – Sydney McLaughlin-Levrone, Gabby Thomas, Shamier Little, and Alexis Holmes – completed the four laps in 3:15.27, breaking the previous American record in the event set in the 1988 Seoul Olympics and winning its eighth-consecutive gold medal in the event. And Team USA was within 0.1 seconds of the world record that has held for 36 years. In the final relay effort circling the Stade de France's purple track, Little ran a leg of 49.48, McLaughlin-Levrone a leg of 47.71, Thomas a leg of 49.30, and Holmes with a time of 48.78. Only Holmes ranked second in leg; the other women all ranked first. Netherlands took the silver medal more than four seconds behind the USA with a time of 3:19.50. Great Britain took the bronze medal with a time of 3:19.72. Gabby Thomas separated herself as the most decorated American runner at the Paris Olympics, the only track athlete to win three gold medals this summer. Thomas' 4x400 triumph joined her previous victories in the 4x100 and the individual 200m competition. It was a fitting end to the athletics portion of the Paris Games, with Team USA winning 34 medals, 14 of them gold.

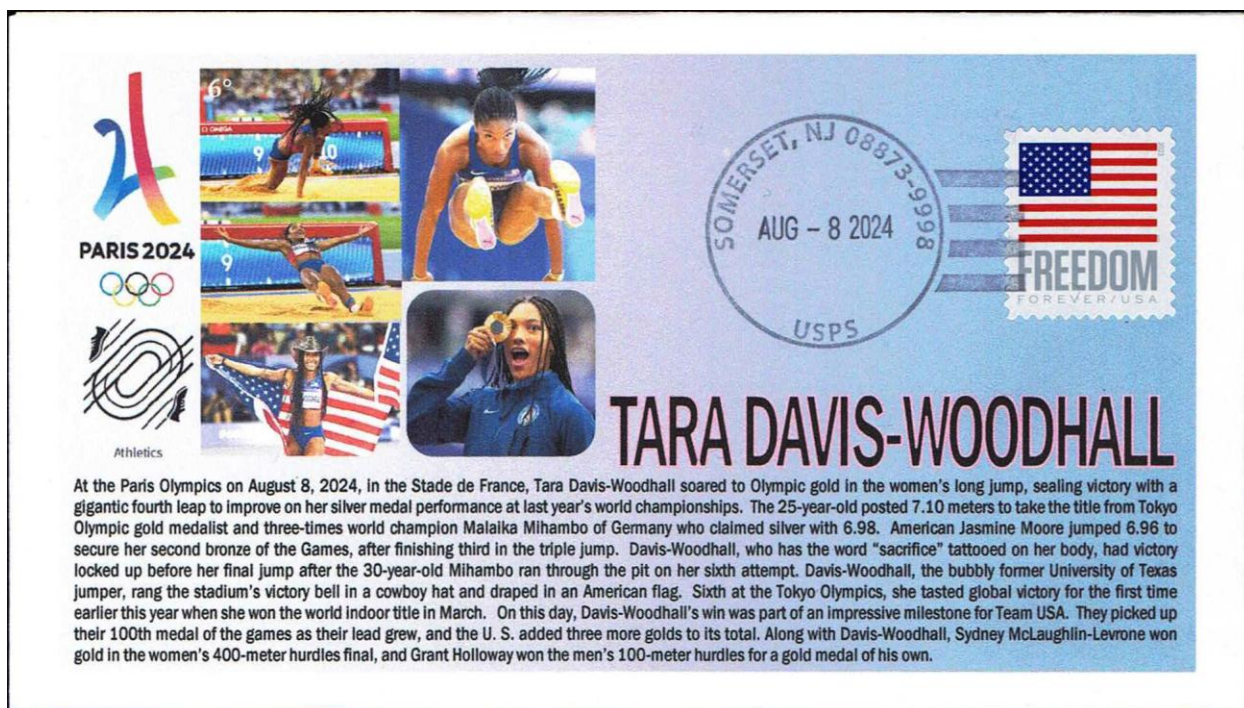

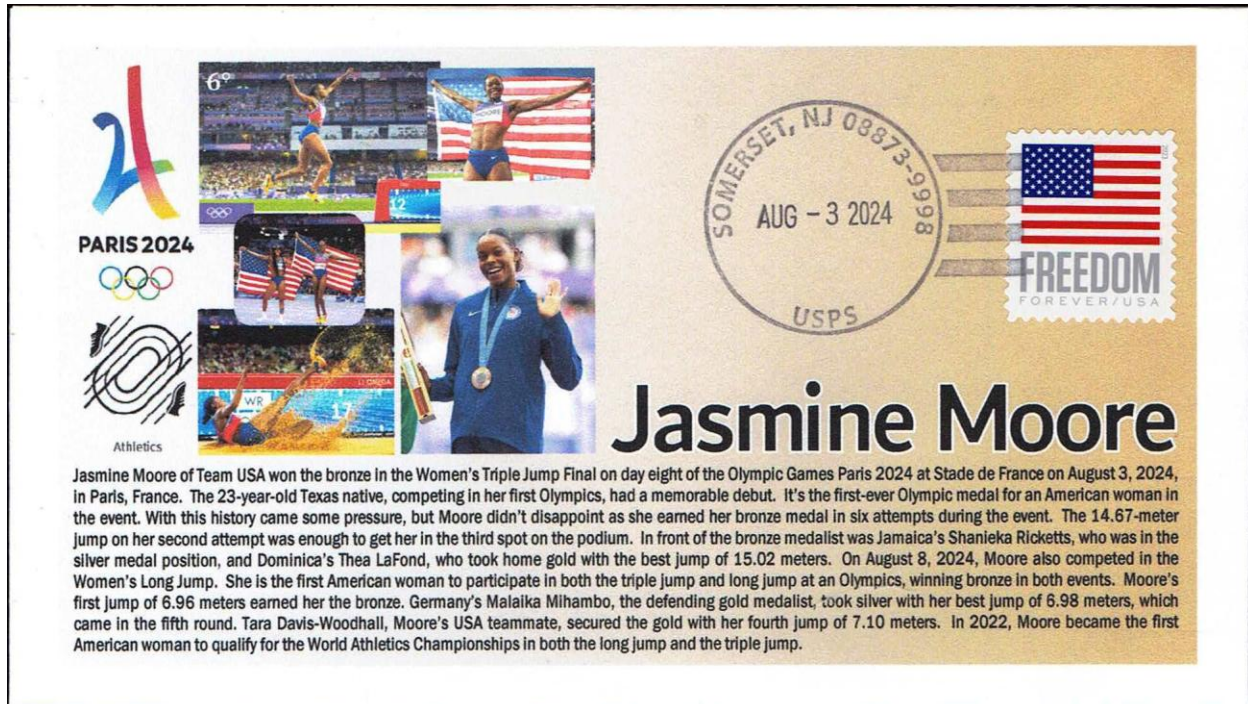
At the Paris Olympics on August 8, 2024, in the Stade de France, Tara Davis-Woodhall soared to Olympic gold in the women's long jump, sealing victory with a gigantic fourth leap to improve on her silver medal performance at last year's world championships. The 25-year-old posted 7.10 meters to take the title from Tokyo Olympic gold medalist and three-times world champion Malaika Mihambo of Germany who claimed silver with 6.98. American Jasmine Moore jumped 6.96 to secure her second bronze of the Games, after finishing third in the triple jump. Davis-Woodhall, who has the word "sacrifice" tattooed on her body, had victory

Jasmine Moore of Team USA won the bronze in the Women's Triple Jump Final on day eight of the Olympic Games Paris 2024 at Stade de France on August 3, 2024, in Paris, France. The 23-year-old Texas native, competing in her first Olympics, had a memorable debut. It's the first-ever Olympic medal for an American woman in the event. With this history came some pressure, but Moore didn't disappoint as she earned her bronze medal in six attempts during the event. The 14.67-meter jump on her second attempt was enough to get her in the third spot on the podium. In front of the bronze medalist was Jamaica's Shanieka Ricketts, who was in the silver medal position, and Dominica's Thea LaFond, who took home gold with the best jump of 15.02 meters. 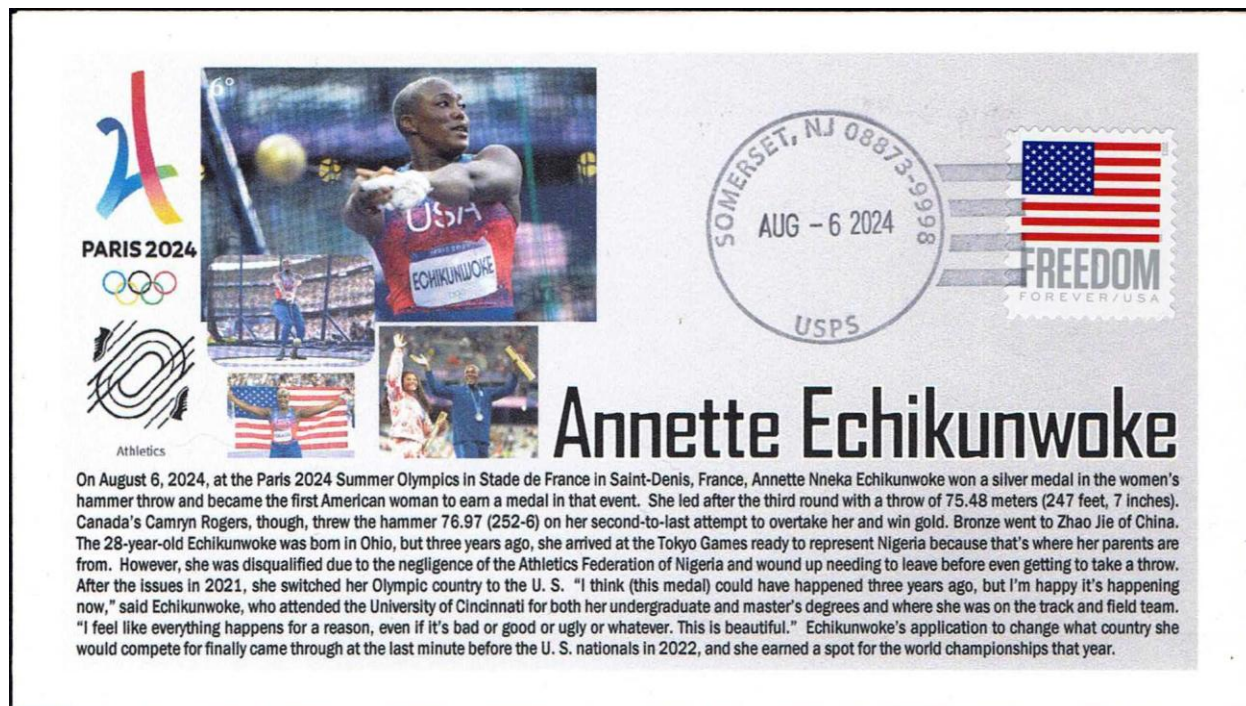

On August 6, 2024, at the Paris 2024 Summer Olympics in Stade de France in Saint-Denis, France, Annette Nneka Echikunwoke won a silver medal in the women's hammer throw and became the first American woman to earn a medal in that event. She led after the third round with a throw of 75.48 meters (247 feet, 7 inches). Canada's Camryn Rogers, though, threw the hammer 76.97 (252-6) on her second-to-last attempt to overtake her and win gold. Bronze went to Zhao Jie of China.

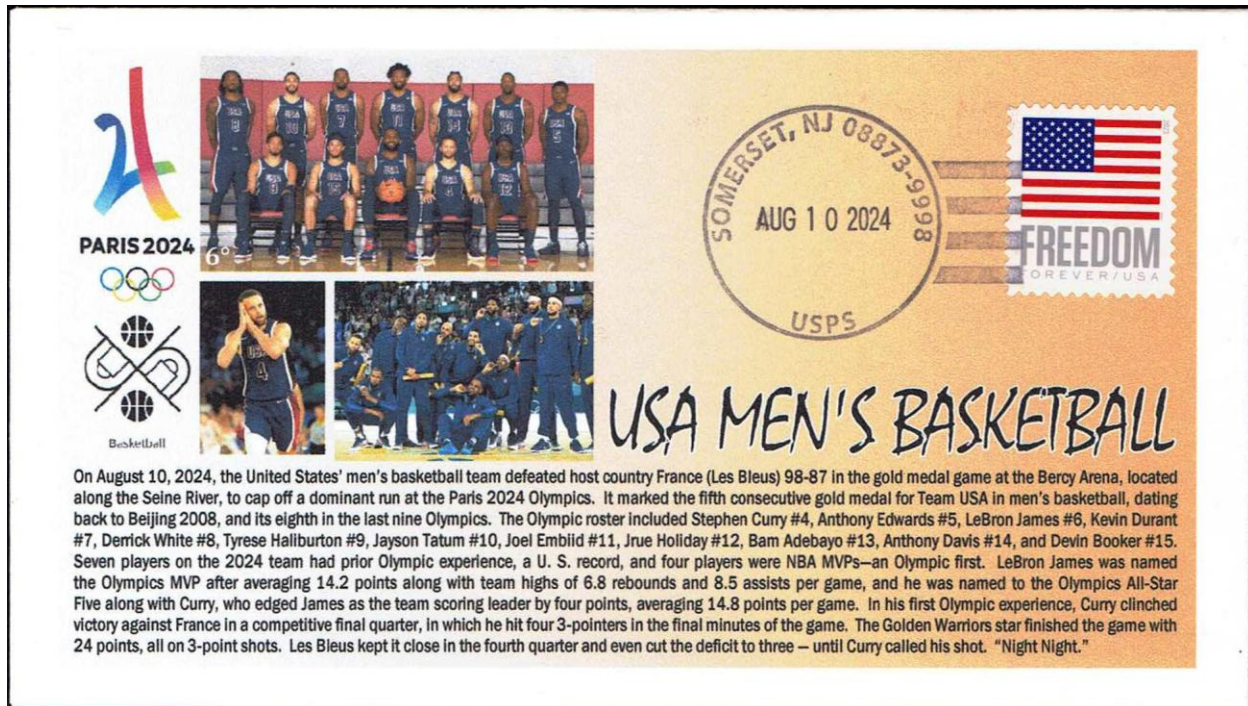

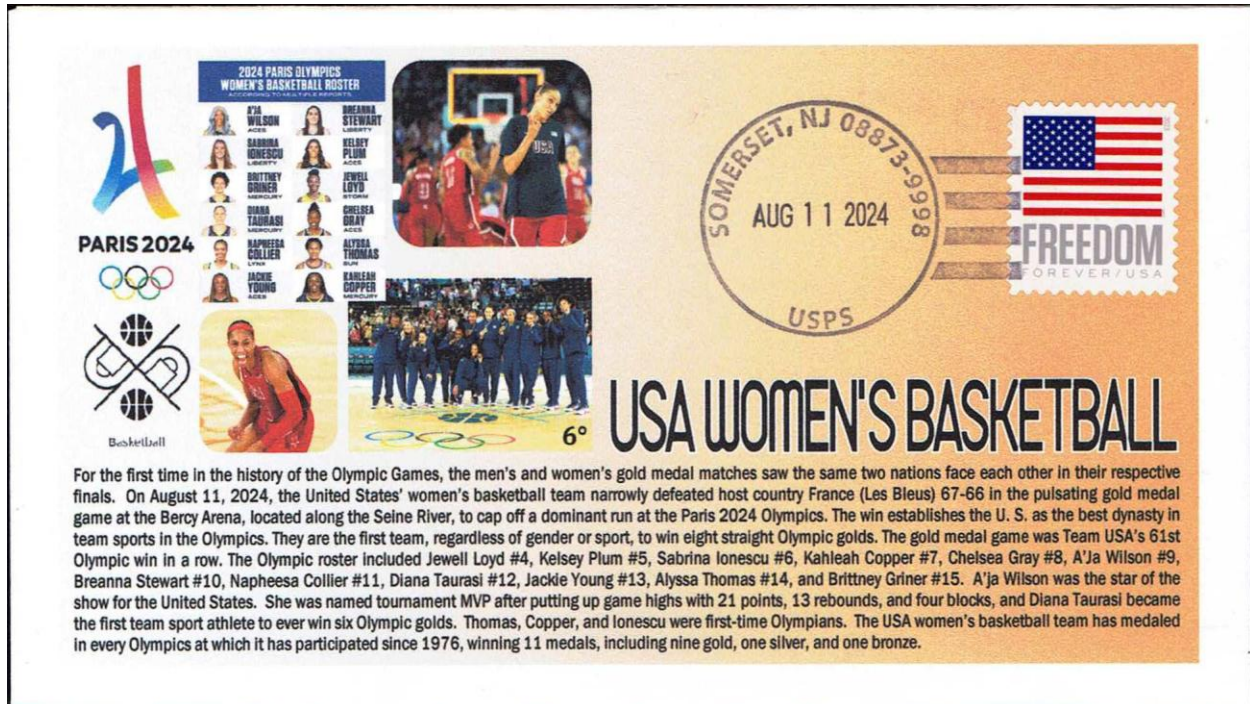

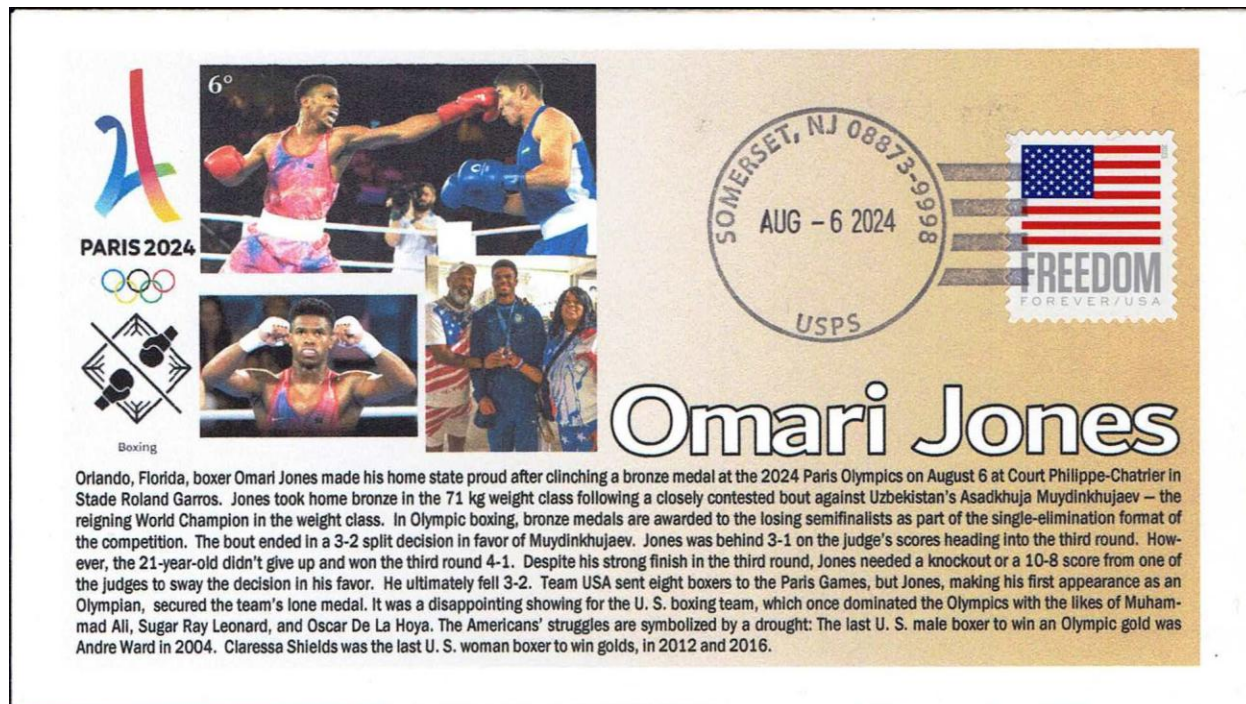

Orlando, Florida, boxer Omari Jones made his home state proud after clinching a bronze medal at the 2024 Paris Olympics on August 6 at Court Philippe-Chatrier in Stade Roland Garros. Jones took home bronze in the 71 kg weight class following a closely contested bout against Uzbekistan's Asadkhuja Muydinkhujaev – the reigning World Champion in the weight class. In Olympic boxing, bronze medals are awarded to the losing semifinalists as part of the single-elimination format of the competition. The bout ended in a 3-2 split decision in favor of Muydinkhujaev. Jones was behind 3-1 on the judge's scores heading into the third round. However, the 21-year-old didn't give up and won the third round 4-1. Despite his strong finish in the third round, Jones needed a knockout or a 10-8 score from one of the judges to sway the decision in his favor. He ultimately fell 3-2. Team USA sent eight boxers to the Paris Games, but Jones, making his first appearance as an

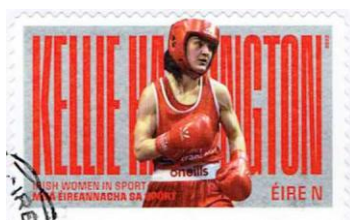

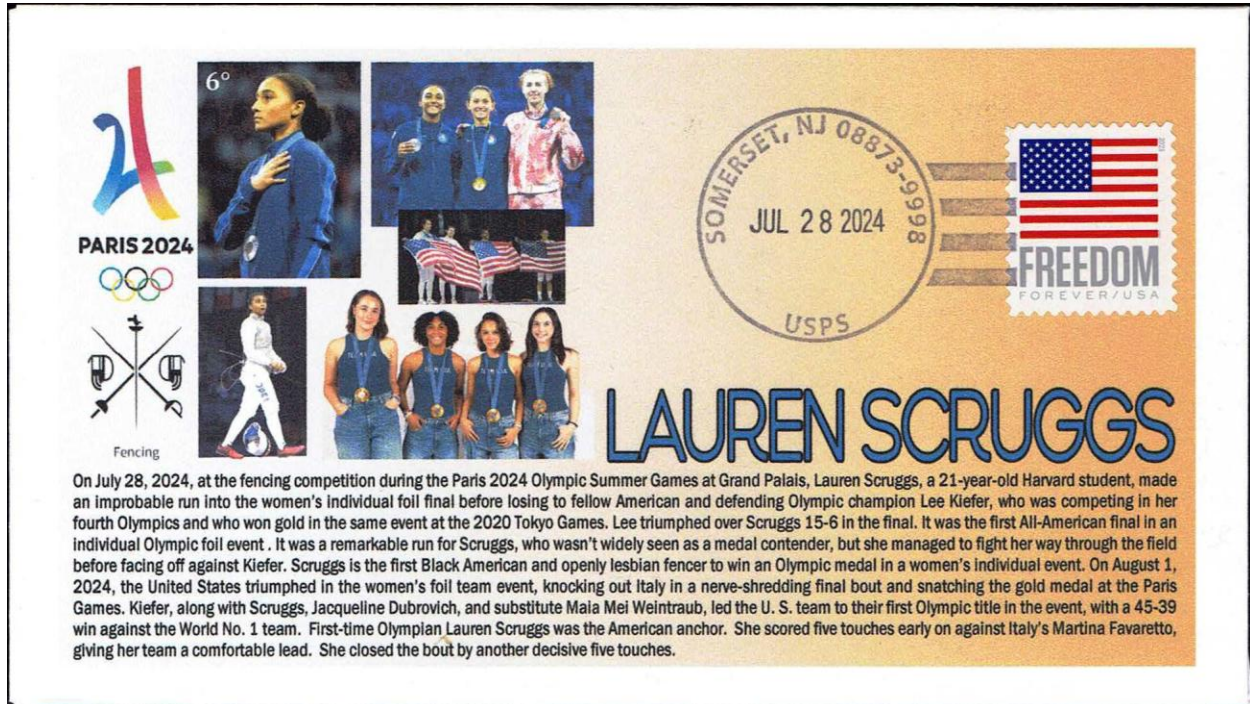

On July 28, 2024, at the fencing competition during the Paris 2024 Olympic Summer Games at Grand Palais, Lauren Scruggs, a 21-year-old Harvard student, made an improbable run into the women's individual foil final before losing to fellow American and defending Olympic champion Lee Kiefer, who was competing in her fourth Olympics and who won gold in the same event at the 2020 Tokyo Games. Lee triumphed over Scruggs 15-6 in the final. It was the first All-American final in an

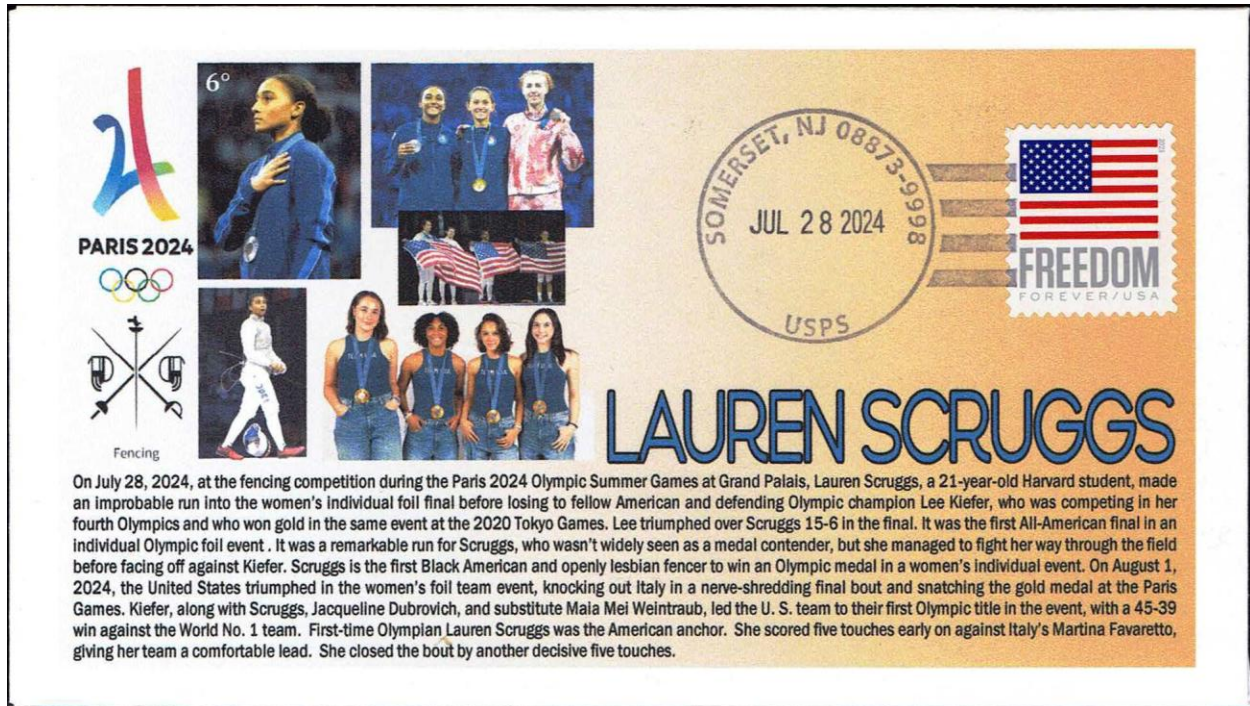

before facing off against Kiefer. Scruggs is the first Black American and openly lesbian fencer to win an Olympic medal in a women's individual event. On August 1, 2024, the United States triumphed in the women's foil team event, knocking out Italy in a nerve-shredding final bout and snatching the gold medal at the Paris Games. Kiefer, along with Scruggs, Jacqueline Dubrovich, and substitute Maia Mei Weintraub, led the U. S. team to their first Olympic title in the event, with a 45-39 win against the World No. 1 team. First-time Olympian Lauren Scruggs was the American anchor. She scored five touches early on against Italy's Martina Favaretto,

Team USA ended the day with 26 total medals but still had some work to do when it came to gold. Cue the women's artistic gymnastics team, which once again brought home the gold in Team All-Around finals with an impressive score of 171.296 thanks to huge showings from Simone Biles, Jade Carey, Sunisa Lee, Jordan Chiles, and Hezly Rivera. Women's Water Polo

On August 7, 2021, at the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Summer Games, the U.S. women's water polo team handily defeated Spain in the gold medal match thanks to an aggressive offense, a goalie who made block after block, and her teammates who scored goal after goal. Ashleigh Johnson, who in 2016 became the first Black woman to make a U.S. Olympic water polo team and who is considered one of the best goalies in the world, repeatedly lunged out of the water and across the goal to block 11 out of 15 shots from Spain during her time in goal – a rate of 73% – all while treading water. The main goalie for Spain blocked 19% of the shots, and the final score was 14 to 5. Nine Team USA players scored against Spain, including Madeline Musselman, who had three goals. With the victory, the Americans became the first women's team in the sport (which debut at the 2000 Sydney Games) to win three consecutive Olympic gold medals, starting nine years ago at the 2012 London Olympics where Team USA also defeated Spain to win the gold.

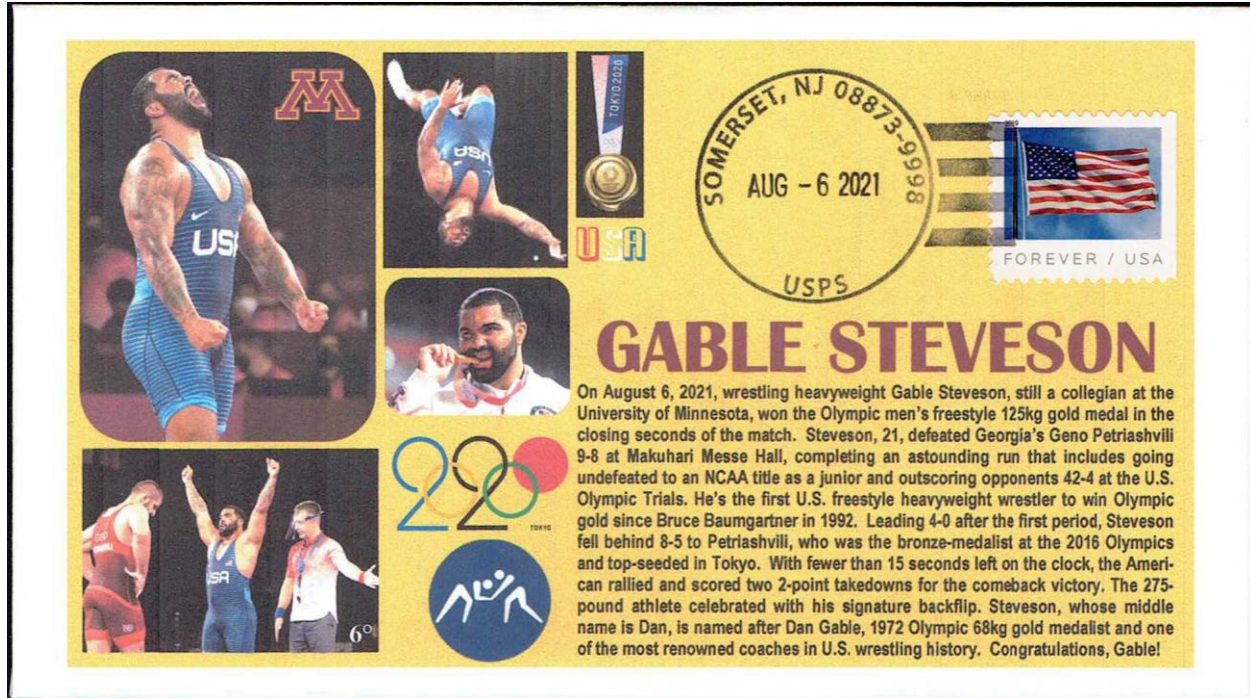

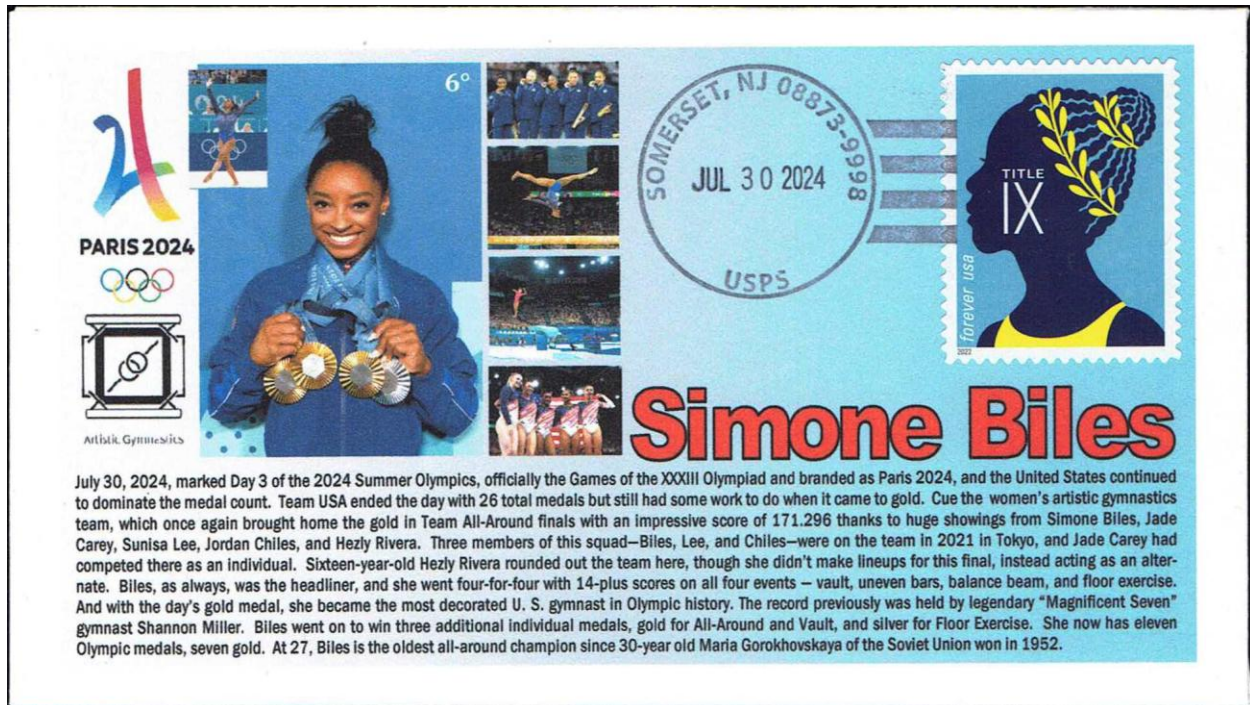

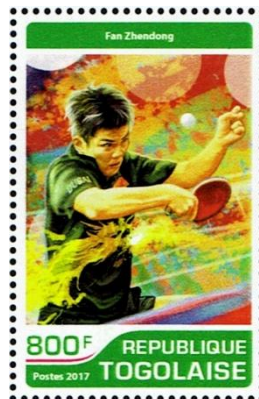
